- U.S. citizenship, permanent residency, or approved refugee status.
- At least half-time enrollment at a participating Michigan institution.
- The Talent for Tomorrow Scholarship requires full-time enrollment.
- The student not be in default status on a State or Federal student loan.
- The student meets
 Satisfactory Academic
 Progress (SAP) standards.

Complete the Free Application for Federal Student Aid (FAFSA)

Complete the FAFSA at <u>fafsa.gov</u> as early as October 1 of your senior year in high school and every year you remain in college. For priority consideration of State aid programs, complete the FAFSA before March 1.

MiSSG Student Portal

A few days after you complete the FAFSA, MI Student Aid receives a copy of it. Log into the Student Portal at www.michigan.gov/missg to see what State aid programs you may qualify for. While logged in, you can also change your college choice and complete additional applications.

Make Sure MI Student Aid Knows Where You Are Attending

If you qualify for an award, we will send your aid to the college listed in the MiSSG Student Portal. Make sure you have the correct one selected!

Attend College

Attending an eligible Michigan college at least half-time is required to receive State aid funds. The State aid you qualified for should be listed on the award letter from your college.

All State aid funds are sent directly to the college.
